#### 40 years in Egypt

His name means "drawn out"

Son of Amram & Jochebed

Sister: Miriam Brother: Aaron

From the tribe of Levi (priestly tribe)

Hidden by parentsas long as possible to escape death

Placed in a basket and floated down the Nile River to escape death

Found by Pharoah's daughter, yet nursed by his own mother

After Moses was weaned he was returned to Pharoah's household

He was a Hebrew slave who was raised as Pharoah's grandson

He grew to maturity and gained an education in the household of the king who sought to kill him



At age 40 Moses committed murder when he saw an Egyptian beating a Hebrew, one of his own people Moses fled from the Egyptians and his own people and went to the land of Midian

He married a Midianite shepherdess named Zipporah

They had two sons, Gershom & Eliezar

He worked for his father-in-law, Jethro, as a shepherd for 40 years

At age 80, he met YHWH when the LORD spoke to him through a burning bush on Mt. Horeb

God called Moses to deliver His people from Egyptian bondage

#### 40 years wandering in the desert

God used Moses & Aaron to challenge Pharoah to release the Hebrew slaves

After ten plagues, the Hebrews were free to go (approximately 1445 BC)

Approximately 2.5 million slaves left their bondage (600,000 men, not counting women & children)

It took them 3 months to get from Egypt to Mt. Sinai

At Mt. Sinai Moses received the law and instructions for worship (tabernacle built)

The stayed at Mt. Sinai for one year

After unbelief of the 12 spies sent into Canaan, the Israelites must wander for 40 years in the desert

All males 20 years and older, except Joshua & Caleb will die during those 40 years

At age 120, Moses climbs Mt. Nebo and looks over into the Promised Land of Canaan, nevering entering it His eyes were not weak, nor his strength gone
